



Mounted Assistance Unit (MAU) Program Update



What is Required to Become a **MAU Volunteer?**

The selection of MAU volunteers is based on several criteria. Member must complete an orientation

/ evaluation ride, process the proper County and MAU paperwork, and certify on their horse as a team. Once certified, members attend monthly meetings, patrol at least eight hours per month, participate in refresher training, and maintain ETI membership, First Aid & CPR certification, and LA County ID.

What Makes a Good MAU Volunteer?

We are looking for new members with the following characteristics:

- 1) Demonstrated interest in the equestrian community and the MAU
- 2) Experienced horsemanship or willingness to obtain necessary experience
- 3) Willingness to serve commitment
- 4) Ability to serve time, resources, support
- 6) Reputable professional, ethical, courteous, cooperative
- 7) Reliable willing to assume necessary responsibilities

8) Leadership and communication skills – able to serve the public, the County, and the MAU



Challenges offer trainers a shot

Jessica Abatie has always had a love for horses, but she had no intention of ever becoming a horse trainer.

"It just evolved that way," said Abatie of Estacada, Ore. "People just started throwing me horses, so I just started doing more of that. I think it was my task. That was in the cards for me.

"I just love it. The passion and the drive for how the horse work and the bond and the emotions that go into it are all just like doing a drug."

That passion also is why she has been involved in Colt Starting Challenge USA, which will conduct its next event February 24 & 25, 2017 at the George Ingalls covered arena in Norco CA from 6pm to 9pm on Friday night, and 6pm to 10 pm on Saturday night. Tickets are \$15 to come watch the show.

"I was actually the first woman to win any of their challenges," she said. "I did it off the suggestions from Kyle Hockett, who was the 2015 National Champion for Colt Starting Challenge USA Finals.

"It makes you hone in on your efficiency and the essentials of where you need to be when you're starting a horse. If you're efficient and know the right roads to go down, you can be effective."

At Colt Starting Challenge USA events, trainers will be matched with young horses that have had limited handling, had never been saddled nor bridled. They will work for two hours on the first day of the two-day competition. The second day will feature two 45-minute sessions. The final segment will feature trainers riding their colts through an obstacle course.

Trainers utilize Natural Horsemanship techniques, which utilize each animal's

natural instincts. Gerry Cox understands that better than most. Not only has the Colville, Washington man been a competitor, he also served as a judge during the 2015 & 2016 Colt Starting Challenge USA National Finals, which takes place each December in Las Vegas in conjunction with the National Finals Rodeo.

"I hope to judge it again," Cox said with a laugh. "When I first heard about it, I always wanted to jump into these competitions, but so many of them we never heard about until after the fact."

That was before Russell and Cristy Beatty created Colt Starting Challenge USA. Now that the Beattys have shared their dreams with the country, the potential contestants and fans of colt starting are getting more advanced notice. That's made quite a difference, Cox said.

"Russell and Cristy have created a program that is traveling the country in an effort to open the opportunity for lots of up-and-coming horsemen to show their stuff," he said. "It's a demonstration of what can be done in four hours and what should not be done in four hours.

"A talented horseman can make stuff happen in four hours, where the average horseman would probably take a couple of weeks. But with those experiences and knowing how to read a horse, those guys can pull it off. It takes a lot of days of dedication and grinding and learning and being open to learning new things while also being humble to get where you could be at that level."

Each challenge is filled with rising stars in the game, and the best of the best will have their shot at the National Title in December.

"I want to make the finals," Abatie said. "I want to step up as a woman and be a clinician. I have to earn that respect from people first, so I have to show it and prove it four ways to Sunday."






31st Annual Spring Ride - Bear Valley Springs Written by Kelli Land, Corral 12



This year's ETI Spring Ride will be in Bear Valley Springs near Tehachapi June 4-10, 2017. Tehachapi and BVS are an approximately 2-hour drive from the Los Angeles area. ETI's cook crew will prepare our meals (breakfast, a variety of lunch fixin's, dinner, and dessert). Our trail boss will lead us on four days of wagon-wheel rides, with a duration of 4-6 hours thru the valley and mountain trails. In camp, our equine pals will have corrals to stay in. Camp sites do not have electricity; however, there are showers and toilets nearby for those not self-contained. Riders will have plenty of time for rest and social time with other riders. Midweek, we have a day of rest when riders can explore the nearby town of Tehachapi, hike, sleep in, head over to the winery for a taste of the local wine, or even a game of golf.



Bear Valley Springs is a private gate-guarded community located in the Tehachapi Mountains in California. With 25,000 acres of land, elevations range from 4,118 feet to 6,934 feet (Bear Mountain). BVS amenities include a country club, golf course, tennis, equestrian center, horse trails, rifle range, swimming, indoor recreation, lakes and wilderness areas.

Originally settled by the Fricket family in 1859, BVS remained an isolated and remote hidden valley. By the early 1900's the family had expanded their holdings to 25,000 acres. By 1959, the immediate family had passed, the heirs of the ranch eventually sold to a developer, and Bear Valley Springs was born. In the early 1970's, the first properties were sold. Over 1700 homes have been built, maintaining the rural life that is the charm of this hidden valley.



The Bear Valley Springs Equestrian Center and campground will be our site to camp. The equestrian center boasts 42 acres of equestrian amenities. There are over 50 miles of trails groomed and maintained by BVS resident trail crews. The valley, mountains, and trails provide views of abundant wildlife, Surprise Lake (which is known to appear and disappear on wet vs. dry years), wildflowers, and spectacular views of the valley.

Save the dates! Join ETI's 31st Annual Spring Ride and enjoy the hidden wonders of Bear Valley Springs. See you there.

Trail Rider Award Program T. R. A. P.

It's TRAP! What is "TRAP" you ask? TRAP is ETI's Trail Rider Award Program!



What does it do? A heck of a lot more than it sounds!

All your TRAP dues of \$6.00 are due in January.

ETI TRAP keeps computerized logs on how many hours members are riding and where.

In this day and age, when trails are giving way to housing developments, it is crucial that records be kept on trail usage.

ETI Corrals in all areas are finding themselves having to defend their riding areas more and more against encroaching civilization. On several occasions, TRAP records have been instrumental in maintaining trail access.

When a Corral calls ETI TRAP and identifies a specific problem area, TRAP not only provides them with actual riding statistics of usage, but TRAP members are notified to increase usage and support in that particular area.

Documentation from 'trail logs' turned in by TRAP members are proof that trails are being used by equestrians.

ETI TRAP acknowledges hours in the saddle with shoulder patches and pins that can be attached almost anywhere.

Lest we offend the "cart" people, TRAP also counts those non-arena hours of driving time spent on the trails.

How much does all this cost? It's cheap!!! The fee to join TRAP is only \$12.00 (you must maintain current ETI membership); then the TRAP membership is maintained each year for only \$6.00.

You will start by receiving the TRAP main shoulder patch (about the size of a police patch), and your log sheets. As you hit the hour goals (100, 200, 500, etc.), additional patches will be sent to you. When you reach the higher levels, your hours will be acknowledged with pins instead of patches.

"Another Grassroots Victory! The Chesebro Meadow is Saved!" This is, of course, the meadow behind the single row of houses starting from Driver along Chesebro Rd., Agoura. "The preservation of this meadow actually doubled this critical Wildlife Corridor linkage where wildlife is attempting to cross from north into our southern national parkland."

"This meadow ecosystem with its abundant wildlife is now preserved for hikers, bikers, joggers, and horseback riders to enjoy forever."

Rondell Oasis Hotel, Parking for Equestrians for access to the Juan Bautista de Anza National Historic Trail - a CRITICAL NEED!

YOU may not be aware of the long and drawn out process between the City of Calabasas and Rondell Oasis Hotel LLC owned by Richard Weintraub of Malibu. I have attended as many hearing as I was able to bring to the attention of the City of Calabasas Council and Commissioners, and Mr. Weintraub that this hotel will most thoroughly block the Juan Bautista de Anza National Historic Trailhead.

This is the only location available for equestrians to park horse trailers to access this national historic trail. It connects with the Calabasas Millennial Trail, and it is even possible for a rider or hiker to reach the National Backbone Trail in the Santa Monica Mountains. This is the only location for a school bus load of children to access the Anza Trail, and enjoy the many kiosk signs placed by the Santa Monica Conservancy telling about the history of this area – what happened here in February 1776. Schools should be made aware about this interesting part of local California History!

One other access to the Anza Trail is at the western most dead-end of Calabasas Road. This is a dead-end small circle, and if any cars or other vehicles are parked along the curbs of this circle roadway, it is impossible for a horsetrailer to be parked there as well.

It has become critical that parking be established within the confines of the western end of the Anza Trailhead, the Rondell Oasis Hotel and Rondell Street. Rondell Street as planned by the City of Calabasas is proposed for a "Park & Ride" location, which again does not allow for horse trailers. I have attached the U.S. Dept. of Transportation & Federal Highway Administration Equestrian Design Guidebook for Trails, Trailheads and Campgrounds, Chapter 8—Designing

Roads and Parking Areas. I have highlighted the most important aspects of this guidebook.

I want to also note the early attempt by the National Park Service to notify the City of Calabasas through a letter dated 04 December 2015 directed to Michael Kline, Planner, City of Calabasas Planning Division, was apparently completely unheeded by the City of Calabasas Council. At the June 2016 hearing for the Rondell Oasis Hotel, the Council stated that it was a "done deal" for the developer with the Calabasas City Council. No one was interested in providing any amenities for the users at either end of the of the Juan Bautista de Anza National Historic Trail, even though this trail connects with the Millennium Trail in Calabasas and the California State Parks 67 mile long National Backbone Trail in the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area.

There still are NO PLANS for BATHROOMS or WATER for trail users and riders horses. The developer at one hearing said that it could be possible for the general public to use the hotel bathrooms and water. HOG WASH! No hotelier is going to want the general public to come into the hotel to use the bathrooms or fill their water bottles or buckets to water horses.

Only one member on the Calabasas City Council understands the needs for hikers, horseback riders and school children. The new 2017 MAYOR, Mary Sue Maurer.

Here is my most recent communication to the City of Calabasas Planning Dept.:

"RE: Rondell Oasis Hotel, Parking for Equestrians for access to the Juan Bautista de Anza National Historic Trail.

"Dear Ms. Tamuri,

"After the amazingly long Calabasas City Council meeting last Wednesday, January 11, 2017, I was pleased to hear from the City Manager Tony Coroalles that parking for people wishing to use the Juan Bautista de Anza National Historic Trail is still being discussed. [I was allowed to speak around 11: PM; got home at midnight.]

"As a stakeholder, I would like to offer my equestrienne services to you to help the City of Calabasas Council and Commissioners fully understand the needs of drivers of equestrian rigs for parking and turn around access to the Juan Bautista de Anza National Historic trailhead that will be buried behind the Rondell Oasis Hotel when it is built.

"Our equestrian needs are definitive, and a visual of the size of the larger rigs which should have



access to the Anza National trailhead I feel certain would help staff understand.

"Sincerely, ~~Stephanie Abronson, Equestrian Trails, Inc., Corral 36, Also representing the Monte Nido Valley Community Association

There is still hope if we can bring pressure. Can you please help to bring strength to our CRITICAL NEED to find parking, bathrooms and water to the Anza trailhead behind the planned hotel? I can be contacted at Stephanie@abronson. com.

The LA Equine Advisory Committee (EAC) participated in this year's Martin Luther King Parade in South LA. President Dale Gibson and his son trailered to Compton, along with several equestrians from Gibson Ranch. They joined in support of two other South LA members of the EAC, excellent horsemen, who decided to ride in the parade to represent the EAC. It was a lot of fun, and very moving according to the riders who participated. There weren't that many horses in this huge parade, and the public was thrilled and grateful to see horses. Next year, we'll participate again, hopefully with even more riders. We'll give more notice as this was a quick, spontaneous decision.

It is possible that for those of us who don't have a horse that would tolerate a Parade environment, that our Mayor's appointee, Scott Perez, of Rocken P stables could provide suitable horses for that event.

Due to the forecast of heavy rains, and much to the distress of the Atwater equestrians, the Army Corps of Engineers decided it was prudent to erect the HESCO barriers that they installed last year. These barriers are to prevent flooding to the homes and stables along the east side of the LA River at Atwater. They are about 6 feet high, a couple of feet wide and they are filled with dirt. They fit tightly together so it is impossible for horses, pedestrians or other trail users to access the trails. They are so heavy, that it would take a forklift to move even one barrier. They were put up last year to protect from the ""Godzilla rains" that were predicted by the weather service. The barriers went into place in January of 2016 and were not removed until May, 2016. Trail users were landlocked from the trails. Equestrians trailered over

to Griffith Park, or took a chance and rode along Los Feliz Blvd, braving the traffic to reach the Park entrance.

Now closure of Atwater access has again by Army Corp due to the rains. The HESCO barriers are back in place as of the week of January 16. It is not clear how long these barriers will be in place, much to the frustration of local trail users.

At the Riverside Bridge project, work has resumed. They are pouring concrete for widening the Riverside Bridge on the east side. It is expected that by October 15, 2017, all work will be completed and cleaned up, done. They are a year ahead of the projected finish date on this huge, complicated work project.

There was a recent conflict over bikes on the Mariposa Bridge, resulting in Burbank Police Department arriving to deal with the matter. The bicyclist, who insisted that he could legally push or carry his bike across the bridge was completely wrong. In 2016, the Burbank City Council passed a very closely worded ordinance to state that bikes being pushed or carried across the bridge did not make the biker pushing the vehicle technically a "pedestrian".

Burbank passed an ordinance forbidding bikes on the bridge. No bikes allowed, not pushed or carried. The Mariposa Bridge is for equestrians and pedestrians only. To clarify a confusing situation, Mariposa Bridge belongs to Burbank, and problems on the bridge will be handled by Burbank P.D. The City of Los Angeles has no jurisdiction over the Mariposa Bridge. LA Rangers will not come to deal with bike on the bridge issues.

Once the bike leaves the bridge, then all of that property belongs to LA Recreation and Parks. Immediately off the south end of the bridge is LA City Park land where bikes on dirt trails are illegal. You can report bikes on City Park lands to the park Rangers at (323) 644-6661. Both Burbank PD phone number (818) 238-3000 and Ranger phone numbers should be in your cell phone. It is helpful to Burbank PD and L.A. Rangers if you can get a photo of the biker who is using the bridge or trail illegally.

In general, in LA City Park, please report suspicious activities, vandalism, illegal activities, bikers on dirt trails, dumping, vicious dogs, cars on the trail, drones or other hazardous activities.




Equine Specialist Workshop - March 23-26, 2017



The Equine Specialist workshop is a three-day workshop offered to equine professionals and therapeutic riding instructors who work or would like to work with students with mental health and/or learning issues. The workshop also benefits those who work with mental health or education professionals, helping to enhance cooperation and provide a more complete experience.

This workshop will give an overview of Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship International (PATH Intl.) standards and core values, and provide overviews of EFL and EFP programs and examples of what EFL or EFP sessions will look like. In addition, ES workshops will detail the role the equine specialist is meant to play in a session, offer lesson roleplays and hands-on experience, and discuss the therapy and education teams and the importance of the equine professional's role in maintaining the safety of all in the team - particularly the equine partner.


